## Job Corps 'definitely' coming, says federal official

### Contractors see campus details; bids due June 13

Federal representatives arrived in Riverton this week to discuss the next steps in the development of the Wind River Job Corps Center in Fremont County.

The \$30-40 million facility is scheduled to open in 2015, providing academic assistance and career and technical training to about 550 students ages 16-24. Miriam Holst, a contract specialist with the U.S. Department of Labor, said it will be important to stick to the schedule once students start to enroll.

"Students are recruited in advance of the opening of the center," Holst said. "They make a commitment to enroll in these programs. (So) if Wind River isn't ready when we say we hope to have it ready, many of these students may decide to leave the program. And we don't want to see that."

Delays also will hurt the local economy, she said – the WRJCC should employ about 100 people once it opens.

#### 'Definitely' happening

Bids for construction are due June 13, with contracts expected to be awarded by June 30.

The center originally was set to open in 2011, so Holst said she is excited the process is moving forward now. She said CooverClark and Associates out of Denver has been working on the design for the campus since 2008.

"So this project has been out there for a period of time," Holst said. "We hope to get this project off the ground."

Later, she offered more confidence that the WRJCC would be built in the coming years.

"I'm going to say 'definitely' for Wind River," Holst said. "We certainly, certainly hope to see this through."

Carol Coover-Clark described plans for the "pedestrian" campus, which will include seven buildings measuring up to 165,000 square feet. The structures will be built in a circle surrounded by a loop road and parking areas, while the center of the property is dedicated to walkers. Coover-Clark pointed out the dry creek running through the middle of campus, with a basketball court and sand volleyball court nearby.

"It's a lot like you'd see at a normal college campus," she said. "There are places to live, play, eat and study."

She said a 200-square-foot welcome booth will be built on the northwest corner with a covered bus pavilion for students waiting to take public transportation off campus. A driveway will guide visitors into the property and toward a 20,000-square-foot administrative office and clinic which neighbors a 34,000 square foot education building to the east.

#### 'Clean and dirty'

"It's comprised of what I'd typically call clean and dirty classrooms," Coover-Clark said of the education building. "Some classrooms are more like (a lecture hall), then there are classrooms where they're welding and doing shop kinds of things."

The job corps will have an energy industry focus, but officials said coursework also will be available in construction, heavy equipment and diesel mechanics, electrical and facilities maintenance, office administration, medical office and allied health work, and welding.

Sandy Barton, executive director of the Fremont County Board of Cooperative Educational Services, pointed out that the energy training will be focused on oil and gas production and not only rig work.

"(Rig work is) short lived and

## Green seeks court clerk appointment; candidate interviews Thursday

Deputy court clerk Kristi H. Green of Lander is seeking the district court clerk seat that will become available in two months when her boss resigns.

"It would be a great privilege to continue to serve the people of Fremont County as clerk of district court," Green said in an interview.

The current district court clerk, Katie Brodie Meredith, tendered her resignation to the Fremont County Commission on Tuesday after nearly 38 years of employment at the Fremont County Courthouse. She has spent the last 18 years as district court

clerk.

Brodie Meredith's resignation from the four-year elected seat is effective June 30.

Because she is a Republican resigning in the middle of her term, the county GOP under state statute must submit three nominees for commissioners to consider when they replace Brodie Meredith.

The county central committee will have interviews with the candidates at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, May 9, in the Fremont County 9th Judicial Circuit Court at the Fremont County Courthouse in Lander. From there, three names will be forwarded to the commission. The interviews are open to the public.

## Land swap finalized in parcels near fairgrounds

The Fremont County Commission has authorized a land swap between the county and the Depot Foundation after years of discussion.

County fair manager Barney Cosner called the deal a "win-win."

The Depot Foundation will gain a parcel of land between the Fremont County Fairgrounds and the Wind River and two tracts totaling 80 acres on the other side.

Allen Moore of the Depot Foundation said his organization plans to build a two-mile paved recreation path on two pieces of land it owns on the north bank and through the newly acquired piece along the fairgrounds.

He said the 80 acres on the south side would be best suited for an equestrian park because it is in the river's floodplain.

The nonprofit organization will give the county a 6.7-acre parcel with utility and street access on the festival grounds' western edge.

"The fair will look at it as additional parking for livestock trailers, which we're dramatically short on," Cosner said.

He said guests also would be able to park in the area.

A similar land swap has been under discussion for some time. Cosner met with commissioners roughly one year ago to discuss such a deal.

The Depot Foundation has worked on creating a path along the river for about five years,

## GOP revives Benghazi investigation

□ Democrats claim the lingering probe is intended simply to embarrass former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton in case she runs for president in 2016.

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans on Wednesday renewed charges that the Obama administration is covering up information about last year's deadly assault in Benghazi, Libya, drawing an angry rebuke from Democrats who accused the GOP of politicizing the issue at a jam-packed hearing.

Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., chairman of the Oversight and Government Reform Committee, said the purpose of the hearing

with three State Department witnesses was to get answers.

The witnesses were Mark Thompson, acting deputy assistant secretary for counterterrorism; Gregory Hicks, the former deputy of mission in Libya; and Eric Nordstrom, a former regional security officer in Libya who testified before the panel in October.

On Sept. 11, 2012, two separate attacks hours apart on the U.S. facility in Benghazi killed Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans. An independent panel led by former top diplomat Thomas Pickering and retired Gen. Mike Mullen concluded that management and leadership failures at the State Department led to "grossly" inadequate security at the mission. The panel's report singled out the State Department's Bureau of Diplomatic Security and the Bureau of Near

East Affairs.

The report failed to placate GOP lawmakers, conservatives and outside groups, some of whom contend that Benghazi is comparable to the Watergate and Iran-Contra scandals and deserves a more thorough examination. Two of the outside groups — Special Operations Speaks and Special Ops OPSEC — have been raising money on the issue.

The target of much of the conservative wrath is former Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, a potential presidential candidate in 2016, who stepped down after four grueling years with very high approval ratings. In her last appearance on Capitol Hill in January, a defiant Clinton took responsibility for the department's missteps leading up to the assault, while rejecting suggestions the administration had tried to mislead the country about the attack.

### Sanford wins in South Carolina

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — In a story of political redemption, Mark Sanford is headed back to Congress after his career was derailed by scandal four years ago.

"I am one imperfect man saved by God's grace," the Republican told about 100 cheering supporters Tuesday after defeating Democrat Elizabeth Colbert Busch to win back the 1st District seat he held for three terms in the 1990s. "It's my pledge to all of you going forward I'm going to be one of the best congressmen I could have ever been."

On Wednesday, Sanford told NBC's "Today" show he thinks his record as a watchdog for taxpayers was more important than his personal redemption story.

"I think I have an incredibly strong track record with regard to watching out for people's pocketbook," he said.

Although the race was thought to be close going into the voting, Sanford collected 54 percent of the vote against Colbert Busch, the sister of political satirist Stephen Colbert, in a district that hasn't elected a Democratic congressman in more than three decades. About 32 percent of the district's voters went to the polls. Green Party candidate Eugene Platt finished far behind.

### Suspects nabbed in \$50M heist

BRUSSELS (AP) — Unlike the brilliant thieves in "Ocean's Eleven," it appears that those behind the clockwork-precision, \$50 million diamond heist at Brussels Airport may not get a Hollywood ending.

After three months of virtual silence on the matter, authorities struck this week, detaining at least 31 people in a three-nation sweep and recovering so many diamonds from the loot Antwerp traders lost that they are still figuring out the exact value.

Officials said that among the people held in Belgium, France and Switzerland on Tuesday and Wednesday are some with violent criminal pasts; the one person held in France is believed to have been one of the robbers at the airport. The evidence seized includes large sums of cash, precious stones and luxury cars.

### 'Miss America' song cut from pageant

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The next Miss America won't hear a familiar refrain when she's crowned in Atlantic City, N.J., in September.

The song, "Miss America," which starts with the words, "There she is, Miss America," will not be part of the pageant.

Miss American Organization Vice President Sharon Pearce said the tune, which was first played in 1955, is no longer included. She says no decision has been made on a final song.

The song was replaced by instrumental music at the 2013 pageant in January after the widow of the songwriter filed a licensing lawsuit in federal court in California in 2012.

### Stocks linger near all-time highs

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were little changed in early trading, keeping the Dow Jones industrial average above 15,000 a day after it closed above the landmark level for the first time.

Markets have rallied this year, bolstered by encouraging economic data, record corporate earnings and ongoing support from central banks. So far, stocks have defied expectations that a sell-off would follow the spring surge.

Internet company AOL plunged \$4.39, or 10.7 percent, to \$36.97 after the company reported earnings that fell short of the forecasts of Wall Street analysts who follow the stock.

## Kidnapper feigned help in search, vigils for his victims

CLEVELAND (AP) — In the years after his friend's daughter vanished while walking home from school, Ariel Castro handed out fliers with the 14-year-old's photo and performed music at a fundraiser held in her honor.

When neighbors gathered for a candlelight vigil just a year ago to remember the girl, Castro was there too, comforting the girl's mother.

Castro, just like everyone else in the tight-knit, mostly Puerto Rican neighborhood, seemed shaken by the 2004 disappearance of Gina DeJesus and another teenager who went missing the year before.

Now he and his brothers are in custody after a frantic 911 call led police to his run-down house, where authorities say DeJesus and two other women missing for about a decade were held captive.

Local news reports say the three young women were starved, raped repeatedly, and then beaten when they got pregnant in a basement Cleveland dungeon run by three brothers, law-enforcement sources said.

The tortured victims were imprisoned in a dilapidated, white-clapboard home with chains mounted to the ceiling for about 10 years before finally escaping.

Michelle Knight, 32, Amanda Berry, 26, and Gina DeJesus, 23,

were treated as sex slaves — kept chained and taped in separate rooms, sources told the local ABC affiliate.

They were also seen naked and on dog leashes in the back yard, according to USA Today.

If they were released for any period, it was only done one at a time, sources told The New York Post.

Combined, they were impregnated up to a total of five times — and mercilessly beaten, according to Post sources and local media.

Authorities have until Wednesday evening to bring charges against the men.

The three apparently been held captive in the house since their teens or early 20s, police said.

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## Nuke officers stripped of their launch authority

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force stripped an unprecedented 17 officers of their authority to control — and, if necessary, launch — nuclear missiles after a string of unpublicized failings, including a remarkably dim review of their unit's launch skills. The group's deputy commander said it is suffering "rot" within its ranks.

"We are, in fact, in a crisis right now," the commander, Lt. Col. Jay Folds, wrote in an internal email obtained by The Associated Press and confirmed by the Air Force.

Asked about this at a Senate hearing Wednesday, Air Force Secretary Michael Donley, the service's top official, explained the problem by stressing that launch control officers are relatively junior in rank — lieutenants and captains — and need to be reminded continually of the importance of "this awesome responsibility" for which they have been trained.

Donley said commanders must "ride herd" on the launch crews, and he said the Minot revelation shows that the Air Force has strengthened its inspection system. He said he is confident that the nuclear missile force is secure.

### Man sentenced in fraud case

**POWELL (AP)** — An Indiana man has been sentenced to 30 months in federal prison for his role in defrauding hospitals in Wyoming and Indiana out of nearly \$1.7 million.

A federal judge on Monday also ordered Michael J. Plake of West Lafayette to spend three years on supervised release after his prison term.

Plake had pleaded guilty to two counts of conspiring to commit mail fraud and one count of conspiring to launder money.

An indictment alleged that Paul Cardwell, who was the former CEO of Powell Valley Healthcare in Wyoming and the former White County Memorial Hospital in Indiana, funneled hospital funds to a bogus staff recruiting firm that Plake supposedly ran, and that the men split the money.

### Stadium getting new playing field

**LARAMIE (AP)** — A new playing surface will be installed this summer at Wyoming's War Memorial Stadium.

The FieldTurf Revolution playing surface on Jonah Field will have a distinctive Wyoming design and will be completed in time for the 2013 college football season. It will cost about \$500,000 and is being paid for with private funds.

FieldTurf has been installed at many top NCAA football stadiums for its grass-like performance and safety.

The new turf will include a depiction of the Teton Range in both end zones along with the traditional words "WYOMING" and "COW-BOYS." Also new will be the lettering "7220 Feet" on both sidelines, indicating the stadium's elevation as the highest Football Bowl Subdivision field in the nation.

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## Wyoming joins New Mexico in fight to restore mineral money

CHEYENNE — U.S. senators from Wyoming and New Mexico said Tuesday they plan to roll out legislation this week to restore about \$110 million in cuts to a federal minerals payment program that hit their states the hardest.

Wyoming, the nation's biggest coal-producing state, stands to lose more than \$50 million this year, while New Mexico faces a loss of about \$25 million. They top a list of 35 states that face mineral payment cuts this year.

Sen. Tom Udall, D-N.M., told Interior Secretary Sally Jewell at a hearing in Washington on Tuesday that the federal Mineral Leasing Act requires the federal government to split revenues from the sale of minerals on fed-

eral lands with the states. He said he regards the payments as state revenues that ought to be off limits from federal meddling.

"This revenue is vital to New Mexico, where it funds our public education system," Udall told Jewell. "New Mexico state leaders are very upset by the Department of Interior's Office of Natural

Resources Revenue determination that these state revenues are subject to sequestration."

The federal government last year paid \$2.1 billion to the states as their share of revenue from energy and mineral production on federal lands and offshore. Wyoming received nearly \$1 billion.

The cuts this year trimmed about 5 percent from all the states' shares. Wyoming is losing at least \$53 million this fiscal year, while New Mexico would lose \$26 million.

In other states, the funding cuts are insignificant. North Carolina would use just \$7, Indiana \$187.

Jewell responded to Udall that the cuts were the result of the federal law that required across-the-board budget cuts, not any particular decision by her agency.

## Lawmakers searching for park funding

□ A bill that narrowly was defeated by the Wyoming Legislature might be revived that would allow people to add a donation to the park system when withdrawing money from ATMs.

CHEYENNE (AP) — Wyoming lawmakers are still trying to come up with ways to raise more money for the state park system.

Members of the Legislature's Joint Travel, Recreation, Wildlife and Cultural Resources Committee met Tuesday in Guernsey and agreed to pursue funding beyond the regular state budget.

They discussed possibly reviving

a bill that would allow people to add a donation to the park system when withdrawing money from ATMs.

The bill passed the Senate but died in the House by a few votes last session.

Another option being consid-

ered is setting up a trust fund to help supplement operating costs.

Committee members so far aren't interested in reviving a proposal to collect yearly visitors' fees rather than selling daily passes. That proposal also failed last session.

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### Internet sales taxes

*Cities and towns need sales tax revenue, and the problem isn't going away*

By now most people who follow the news are aware of legislation in Congress that would require most Internet retail sellers to collect sales taxes on every purchase.

Any legislation involving taxes is certain to draw some controversy. That certainly is the case with this bill, whose primary sponsor is Wyoming U.S. Sen. Mike Enzi.

The primary focus of news coverage has been the effect the sales-tax requirement would have on retail businesses operating primarily online, particularly smaller retailers. Impact on consumer sentiment also receives plenty of ink and air time as the effects of the bill are bandied about.

But an important point is being missed in this discussion, perhaps the most important one. In the bigger picture, the entities that will be most affected if this legislation does not pass are the cities and towns of the United States.

In most states of the nation — including Wyoming — many municipal functions are paid for by sales tax revenues. It follows, then, that many cities and towns in Wyoming and elsewhere already have seen their sales tax revenue streams diminished by the rapid advances of Internet-based retail sales.

And when sales-tax revenue is diminished, so are services, facilities, wages and, probably, the effectiveness of local governments.

Yes, any form of tax increase is bound to meet resistance. But those who are opposing the Internet sales tax legislation so vociferously must ask themselves a few important questions. Are they prepared to live in a municipality that has a smaller, less-trained, or under-equipped police force in exchange for not having to pay sales tax on Internet purchases?

Are they prepared to accept less-frequent trash collection and other sanitation services? Will they be satisfied with less-kempt city streets, crumbling sidewalks and curbs, perhaps slower fire or ambulance response, all in the name of saving two dollars on the next purchase from Amazon.com?

The effect on Internet retailers and consumers from this bill certainly is real, but there also is a clear and demonstrated public interest in maintaining healthy sales tax revenue streams to cities and towns.

In Wyoming, there is added impact because our state has no tax on food-based groceries. Ask any mayor in any town in Wyoming how that has gone for local government, and you'll get the same answer: It hurts.

Rest assured that if those sales tax revenues continue to shrink, then there will be only two alternatives for local governments. One is that fees for municipal services such as trash collection, water service, and sewer service, will have to be increased to attempt to make up the difference in funding. The other option is for significant, unpopular cutbacks in municipal services, along with the inevitable reduction in staff, wages, and benefits that would come with the service reduction.

In fact, the more likely result of continuing drop-offs in sales tax revenues is both of the aforementioned outcomes, namely that fees will go up in areas where the city can control them and services will go down anyway.

We live in a publicly funded society to a large extent. When political pressures or consumer convenience threaten the underlying structure of that public mechanism, the results are widespread, unpredictable and highly likely to be undesirable.

Those undesirable outcomes must be evaluated alongside the desirable effects for consumers and business. This is an issue that requires big-picture thinking.

Years ago, the late Ranger publisher and Wyoming State Sen. Bob Peck was one of just a handful of public officials nationwide to begin serving in an effort called the Streamlined Sales Tax Project. Its objective was to find a fair way for local governments to survive with a meaningful level of staffing and services in light of what the project organizers were recognizing as a potentially devastating loss in sales tax revenue as long ago as 2000.

More than a decade later, that objective remains to be met. The new Senate legislation is a fair attempt. If it fails, then it needs to be adjusted and tried again. The problem won't go away. In fact, it will get worse. It remains incumbent upon us, regardless of the outcome of this particular bill, to work through both government and business to make sure that vital municipal services can continue to be funded in the way that they always have.

### Looking for meaning in the sky

I just finished a book called "The Great Divide" by Peter Watson. It delved into the difference between the "old world" and the "new world." A lot of it is about development of religions in the world and people looking up into the skies and wondering and using the night skies for answers. It is an interesting book.

In this month's "Night Skies" there is a reference to Leo, the ancient Egyptians and the flooding of the Nile. Finding meaning in the stars continues today for both science and the spirit. We are still looking to the stars for answers to the age old question of where we came from. Enjoy your month.

A monthly look at the night skies of the northern Rocky Mountains, written by astronomers Ron Canterna, University of Wyoming; Jay Norris, Challis, Idaho Observatory; and Daryl Macomb, Boise State University:

"If you take the pointer stars in the Big Dipper and go south, away from the North Star, you run into the large and easily recognized constellation, Leo the Lion. Its two brightest stars are Regulus and Denebola, and the backward question mark emanating from Regulus, called "the sickle," represents the Lion's head.

"The ancient Egyptians associated Leo with the annual flooding of the Nile since the sun was placed in Leo during that time. Since the Nile was the lifeline of the Egyptians, many believe that ancient lion-headed fountains were a tribute to this cosmological symbol.

"If you happen to be in a dark location and have a moderate-size telescope, look carefully between Regulus and Denebola, where many interesting galaxies can be seen.

"This month, the Eta Aquarids

meteor shower peaks around May 4-5 and is best viewed after midnight toward the constellation Aquarius (in the southeast). Jupiter is seen right after sunset and Saturn can be seen all night long near the star, Spica, in Virgo.

"Cosmic gamma-ray bursts (GRBs) were first detected 46 years ago by the Vela satellites. GRBs are brief (lasting a fraction of a second to hundreds of seconds) blasts of beamed, high-energy electromagnetic radiation arising from the collapse of massive stars or possibly from coalescence of binary compact objects — neutron stars and/or white dwarfs.

"When a bright GRB happens to be beamed in our direction, present-day GRB instrumentation can detect it from all the way across the observable part of the universe.

"The original purpose of the Vela (short for velador, "watchman" in Spanish) was to monitor the Earth's surface for nuclear explosions. The Vela were launched, in pairs, into orbits of about 65,000 miles altitude (one-third of the moon's distance), allowing each of the pairs to monitor almost half of the Earth's surface, as well as a large portion of the sky. In all, 12 Vela were

launched between 1963-70, with the last one operating until its shutdown in 1984.

"The Vela had different detector types for recording various emissions: Scintillation detectors (sodium iodide crystals viewed by photomultiplier tubes) detected X-rays and gamma-rays, and silicon photodiodes ("bhargmeters") detected the visible flash from a nuclear explosion.

"The characteristic visible time profile (intensity vs. time) of a nuclear explosion shows two peaks that rise and fall in less than a second, whereas GRBs have varied, unpredictable time profiles.

"In July 1967, two Vela satellites detected a flash of gamma radiation markedly different from the nuclear explosion profile. During the next few years, the Vela recorded several more GRB time profiles.

"By using light travel time analysis ("triangulation") between two or more Vela, directions to the GRB sources were determined to within a few degrees of accuracy. The resulting approximate random distribution of positions precluded, as the GRB origins, all possible terrestrial and solar system sources.

"Thus, the bursts were judged to be coming from distances at least as far as the hypothetical Oort cloud of comets (about one light-year). However, localization error regions were far too large to isolate any visible wavelength counterpart to a GRB.

"For 30 years, generations of GRB instruments on satellites could not localize bursts well enough to exclude most kinds of cosmic sources — flaring stars, active galaxies, supernovae, etc.

"Next time, we will discuss the Interplanetary Network of satellites, which assisted in eliminating some kinds of sources as the origin of GRBs."



## Asparagus gives dish the taste of spring

Roasted lemon chicken with bell peppers and asparagus is a filling meal that can be prepared in less than an hour.

Fresh lemons, olive oil and Dijon mustard. Together they are the perfect trio to brighten up any dish.

Add a little seasoning and enhance things even more.

In today's dish, the trio is paired with roasted chicken thighs and legs, asparagus and sweet mini bell peppers.

You can't go wrong with any asparagus dish this time of year. My local grocery store has huge displays of this harbinger of spring.

Asparagus is simple and easy to prepare — and that's what's so enjoyable about it. You can roast or steam it and grill or broil it. You can eat it hot or cold and even raw. Go ahead, pick up a spear with your fingers for a tasty snack.

Because asparagus goes with just about anything, I roasted it and mini bell peppers in today's dish. The mini bell peppers are a favorite because they, too, require little prep work. A 2-pound bag costs about \$5.

For this recipe, I roasted the asparagus and the sliced peppers together. The technique I like to use to roast these vegetables is to preheat a sided baking pan that's drizzled with olive oil before I put the asparagus and peppers in. Doing so gives them a quick little sear and sizzle and both are crisp tender in about 7 minutes.

When it came to the chicken, I decided on thighs for this dish because I picked them up at a good sale price. Chicken thighs have tons of flavor and are a nice change from lean boneless, skinless chicken breast. Yes, the thighs and legs have more fat, especially if you factor in the skin. But you can remove it to shave off some fat and calories.

The chicken thighs I bought were in a family pack that contained about 12 thighs.

Today's recipe rocks because you can put it together in the morning and let the chicken marinate all day. Pop it into the oven and get some asparagus and mini red peppers ready to roast while the chicken is roasting. This way, you can have dinner on the table in less than an hour.

### ROASTED LEMON CHICKEN WITH ASPARAGUS AND PEPPERS

Serves: 4

Prep time: 10 minutes  
Total time: 1 hour

#### CHICKEN

- 4 bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs or legs
- 4 chicken legs with skin
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon sea salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

#### GLAZE

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 to 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons Dijon or favorite grainy mustard
- 2 tablespoons maple syrup or honey
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Asparagus and Peppers (see note)

Pat the chicken thighs and legs dry. Remove any excess fat from the chicken thighs. In a glass measuring cup, mix together the olive oil, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Reserve a few tablespoons of this mixture for the asparagus. Place chicken pieces in a large bowl and drizzle the olive oil mixture over, tossing to coat. Refrigerate 2-8 hours.

In a small bowl, whisk together all the glaze ingredients. Set aside.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Place the chicken pieces in a roasting pan, skin-side down. Roast the chicken 25 minutes. Turn chicken skin side-up, brush pieces with some of the glaze and roast 10 more minutes or until chicken is cooked through. Remove from oven and place chicken on a platter; tent with foil.

Pour off as much fat as you can from the roasting pan and set the pan over two burners. Heat, scraping up any bits from the bottom of the pan. Stir in the remaining glaze and heat through. Pour sauce into a small bowl (there won't be a lot of it) and serve with the chicken.

**Note:** To make the asparagus and peppers: Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Rinse and trim tough ends from 1/2 pound asparagus. Slice 8 mini bell peppers into strips.

Drizzle a sided baking sheet with 1 tablespoon olive oil and place in the preheated oven for about 5 minutes. Using oven mitts, carefully remove the baking sheet from the oven. Add the asparagus spears and pepper pieces to the pan; they will sizzle. Place in the oven for 7 minutes or until the just barely tender. Remove from oven and drizzle with the reserved olive oil/lemon mixture or simply season with salt and pepper.

RHS finished the conference season with a 6-3-1 record.

"There has been a lot of understanding that there were some changes that needed to be made," RHS coach Erly Cornejo said. "They have done a good job at executing some of those things as far as trust and ball movement."

With the No. 1 seed, the Wolverines don't have to play Thursday in the must-win matches.

RHS already has a Class 4-A state tournament berth locked up for next week in Rock Springs.

"It's very important that we have the No. 1 seed," Cornejo said.

For one, we have a couple of kids that are injured, and it gives us a couple of days rest. There isn't as much pressure to play them if we don't need to."

RHS plays at 3 p.m. Friday in Evanston vs. either Rock Springs (No. 5 seed) and Evanston (No. 4 seed).

"You are set up better for the rest of the tournament," Cornejo said.

The loser of the Evanston-Rock Springs match will be finished for the season.

"The last time that we played Evanston and Rock Springs, we scored four goals on each of them," Cornejo said.

He doesn't want the Wolverines to let up at the regional tournament.

"I think that it's important for the momentum," Cornejo said. "I think that everybody is pretty even across the state this year."

Cornejo isn't surprised with how White is playing this year on the soccer field.

"When you can play with both speed and you are that big and strong," Cornejo said. "That takes you a long way in soccer."

White scored two goals Saturday in the conference clincher with Evanston, teammate Logan Hartbank and Scot Sowards added one goal apiece.

"In the Evanston game, we saw some goals from other people," Cornejo said. "We did a good job of executing on set pieces that game." White missed an early match this year when the Wolverines beat Worland.

"My main concern is Tristan is on fire, you would like to keep playing," Cornejo said.

Worland is a ranked No. 4 in the Class 4-A division.

It forces us to be more consistent when we play. Hopefully, that will give us an advantage going into the state tournament."

The title game is at 1 p.m. Saturday.

working life as a court clerk for Fremont County.

"I see justice every day, and I believe that the system works," she said.

A year after her graduation from Lander Valley High School in 1982, Green applied for a deputy clerk position at the Fremont County Court, now called Circuit Court.

"I was a young kid out of high school looking for a job," she said. "Judge (Robert) Denhardt gave me an opportunity, which I will always be grateful for."

It was an entry-level job that was the starting point for learning court procedures.

In January 1987, Green was appointed to the chief clerk seat, which she held until January 1995 when she transitioned to work as a deputy clerk for the Clerk of District Court.

"It's pretty humbling to sit down and put it on paper," Green said, referring to the resume of work experience she submitted to the GOP along with her application for the district court clerk position. "I've really stuck with it. It's been 30 years. It's fascinating and rewarding at times, but it's also heart-breaking. But I have had good people to work with,

and great mentors."

### Job duties

The Clerk of District Court office, which is based at the Fremont County Courthouse in Lander, is responsible for managing a variety of different cases: criminal, civil, appeals, probate matters, adoptions, divorces and child support.

"You have to know a lot about court procedures," Green explained. "It's our job to keep those records accurate and organized."

Moore said.

At the commission's meeting, Moore and Cosner said the swap would benefit both of their organizations.

Commissioners at the 2012 meeting were concerned that the property they would trade away would be more valuable than the property they would receive. The county board also had asked for more details on the deal.

Moore and Cosner came to the recent meeting armed with maps and advice from surveyor Gary Hartle.

Some details presented a problem.

A fence separates the fairgrounds and the property the Depot Foundation would acquire, and an irrigation pipe runs outside of it.

Those structures do not leave enough space for construction of a path.

"It would not be a good practice to put a paved road over an irrigation pipeline," Moore said.

Cosner said the fair could probably move the fence 15 feet inward to provide enough space.

"I haven't seen the county take any interest or any use of any of

the spots that have been mentioned," commissioner Keja Whiteman, said referring to the parcel the Depot Foundation wanted to acquire.

both sides."

Commissioner Travis Becker and Cosner said they wanted to move fast on the swap.

"I'd like to get this thing figure out and knocked out by July 1," Becker said.

Cosner said July 1 would be only 19 days before the fair started and suggested they aim to finish the swap in June.

### Building details

Coover-Clark said a 17,000-square-foot cafeteria and warehouse will sit southeast of the education building, and a 19,000 square-foot recreation building will be built next door.

"The little rec building here has a basketball court and some other kinds of workout areas inside," Coover-Clark said.

Next to the gym will be two 26,000 square-foot dormitories, one for men and one for women, and Coover-Clark pointed to plans for a family dorm

and child care facility in the future.

"Those are not in this bid today, but they could be in the bid tomorrow," she said. "Currently it's an unfunded piece of the project that will be added to make this really a comprehensive live, work and play (center)."

Abigail Van Buren Sexual abuse can occur even without actual physical assault

DEAR ABBY: Is there such a thing as non-physical sexual abuse? When I was young, my father would fondle my mother when I came to sleep with them when I had a nightmare. (She would rebuff his advances.) He would also watch porn in front of me.

As I matured, he made comments about my figure. He would barge into my room without knocking and insist he didn't have to knock. He'd tell dirty jokes or talk about sexually inappropriate things. (The day after my wedding he asked my husband how our wedding night had been.) But with all of this, he never touched me or assaulted me.

His actions affected my self-esteem and relationships because as I grew up I thought the only thing I had to offer was being sexy. Thankfully, therapy and my husband helped me to see myself as a fully dynamic person.

I recently began seeing a new counselor who thinks my father was just a dirty old man -- nothing more. Was I abused? Any information you have would be appreciated. -- WONDERING IN WISCONSIN

DEAR WONDERING: When a parent attempts to initiate sex or watch pornography in front of a child, it is sexualizing behavior and it could also be considered "grooming" behavior. Your father's actions were so far out of the normal boundaries that they were off the charts. And yes, it WAS a form of abuse. My advice is to change counselors.

DEAR ABBY: My daughter is mentally ill, homeless and on meth. A year ago, when she wasn't so bad, she asked if I would take her 3-year-old daughter, "Lucy," so she could get herself together. Unfortunately, she went the other direction.

It was fine when I thought that the arrangement was temporary, but when I realized I would be raising Lucy as a single parent at 49, things got hard.

My so-called friends have abandoned me, and so has my much younger boyfriend. But what is actually killing this is that I get no respite. I am an extreme introvert. Constant contact drains me. When I don't have my "recharge" time, I tune Lucy out, and the next thing I know she has cut up the curtains or hidden my shoes. I'm afraid I'm just going to lose it. Work doesn't count; there are people there, too. Bad thoughts are going through my head because I feel such resentment.

I know if I had time for my own mental health, I could be a good surrogate mother to Lucy, but if I can't, I'm starting to think I may have to give her up, and that breaks my heart. I want to scream, to throw things, to just leave the house and walk until I drop. Please help me. -- END OF MY ROPE

DEAR END: How much time do you need to recharge? Would it be an hour or hour and a half at the end of each workday? Would an afternoon during the weekends suffice? Have you discussed this with Lucy's grandfather or her paternal grandparents? They might be willing to get involved and lighten your load. Would a neighbor watch your grandchild on a regular basis if you compensated her or him? How about the person who already takes care of Lucy while you're at work?

Please explore these options if you haven't already. Screaming, throwing things and leaving the little girl alone are not viable scenarios. However, if you feel that you might harm her, it would be better if you placed her for adoption or in foster care.



## Gonzalez goes deep for Rockies

DENVER -- After grinning and bearing the snow during the last homestand, Rockies left fielder Carlos Gonzalez couldn't believe rain hit in the second inning of Tuesday night's game against the Yankees at Coors Field, continuing until the final innings.

"I won't lie -- I was a little angry the whole game," Gonzalez said. "We've been playing in a lot of bad weather, in a lot of bad situations, but we've still got to go out there and do our best."

Gonzalez unleashed his anger by clubbing a high-and-inside, full-count fastball from Hiroki Kuroda into the bullpen in right-center for a two-run homer in the sixth inning -- the only runs in a 2-0 Rockies victory in front of 41,595.

Gonzalez's seventh homer of the season leapfrogged the Rockies over the Giants and into first place in the National League West by a half-game. The game marked the Rockies' first shutout of the season, led by six three-hit innings from lefty starter Jorge De la Rosa (3-3).

It also brought the Rockies to 2-2 during their first Interleague homestand, which has two games with the Yankees remaining.

Before the deciding homer, Kuroda (4-2) had left Gonzalez and the Rockies' hitters all wet.

Gonzalez had gone 0-for-2, including a swinging strikeout on a fastball to open the fourth inning. With two outs in the sixth, Josh Rutledge singled to give Gonzalez his chance.

Tired of the weather, motivated by the knowledge that De La Rosa was through pitching and could use some runs and armed with knowledge gained from his previous at-bat, Gonzalez turned out to be in a good position to win the game.

"The at-bat before, he threw me a fastball with two strikes and it went by me," Gonzalez said. "His delivery is so sneaky; it's tough to pick up. But I was expecting a fastball, and he came with it. On a 2-2 count, I had fouled off another fastball, so I was waiting for it."

"It was a good pitch, still -- middle-in. I was able to put the ball in play and get it over the fence."

The homer spoiled a strong outing from Kuroda, who hadn't delivered many against the Rockies or at Coors Field. He entered with a 1-5 record and a 5.52 ERA in 10 career starts against Colorado and 1-2 with a 6.85 ERA at Coors Field lifetime. On Tuesday, Kuroda gave up seven hits and threw seven strong innings.

## Grizzlies dump OKC in Game 2

Memphis point guard Mike Conley capped off a huge fourth quarter by stepping back and calmly nailing an 18-foot jumper with just more than a minute to play putting his Grizzlies in front by four and leading them to a 99-93 road win over the Oklahoma City Thunder and tying their Western Conference semifinal series at a game apiece.

Conley just missed a triple-double and hit almost every shot he took in the fourth quarter in leading the Grizzlies with 26 points on 11-for-22 shooting. He also had 10 rebounds and nine assists.

Thunder forward Kevin Durant also just missed a triple-double with 36 points, 11 rebounds and nine

assists. The Thunder gave up 30 points in the fourth quarter, 13 of those to Conley, who was 5-for-6 overall and 2-for-3 on 3s in the final 12 minutes of the game.

Conley also led the Grizzlies in rebounds with 10, seven of those in the fourth quarter also. Memphis had three other starters in double figures -- Marc Gasol with 24 points, Zach Randolph with 15 and Tony Allen with 12 as reported by the NBA website.

Oklahoma City got a big game from Derek Fisher who had 19 points on 6-for-9 shooting and 4-for-5 on 3s but not much from anyone else. Serge Ibaka had 11 points and Reggie Jackson had 10 but OKC.

and one point for each third-place vote. The award was tabulated by the independent accounting firm of Ernst & Young LLP.

The Nuggets went 57-25 (.695) -- the league's fourth-best record -- despite beginning the season as the league's third-youngest team with an average age of 24.9 years, and not having a player score more than 16.7 points per game during the regular season. According to NBA.com/Stats, the Nuggets ranked third in assists (24.4 apg), generating an assist on 60.0 percent of their made field goals. Denver ranked fifth in player impact estimate (53.8 percent), offensive rating (107.6) and net rating (+5.6).

The Nuggets' 38-3 record at Pepsi Center was a franchise-best and tied for the 14th best home record in league annals. Additionally, their .927 winning percentage at home was the highest since 2008-09 when the Cleveland Cavaliers went 39-2 (.951) at Quicken Loans Arena.

In his 25th season as an NBA head coach (ninth with Denver), Karl earned two Western Conference

Coach of the Month awards during the 2012-13 campaign. He won for March after leading Denver to a conference-best 13-2 (.867) mark, which included wins in the first 12 games of the month, feeding a 15-game, franchise-tying-best winning streak. He earned his first monthly nod in January after the Nuggets opened the New Year with a 12-3 (.800) record. During January, Karl passed Larry Brown for sixth place on the all-time coaching wins list and notched his 1,100th career win.

The sixth-winningest coach in NBA annals and the active wins leader, Karl has amassed 1,131 career victories in the NBA, including a streak of 21-straight non-losing seasons -- tied with Phil Jackson (21, 1989-90-2010-11) for the most in NBA history.

The Coach of the Year Award is named after legendary coach and Hall of Famer Red Auerbach who guided the Celtics to nine NBA Championships. In 1996, Auerbach was honored as one of the Top 10 Coaches in NBA History as the NBA celebrated its 50th anniversary.
